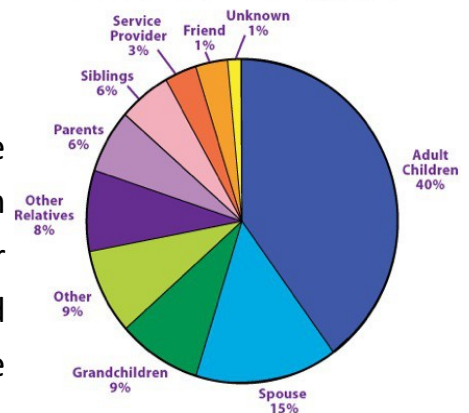


June is Elder Abuse Awareness Month

What is Elder abuse?

Elder abuse is a single, or repeated act, or lack of appropriate action, occurring within any relationship where there is an expectation of trust, which causes harm or distress to an older person. More than half a million cases of elder abuse are reported each year, with millions more going undocumented. Elder abuse can take many forms. These forms include: physical, emotional, and sexual abuse, as well as financial exploitation, neglect, and healthcare fraud. Elder abuse tends to take place where the senior lives, whether at home or in a long-term care facility.

How to Recognize Elder Abuse?

To avoid escalation of elder abuse, it is key to understand the common signs. Common signs of elder abuse include unexplained signs of injury, depression, unsanitary living conditions, sudden changes in the elder’s financial condition, and evidence of inadequate care.

What Can I do to Stop Elder Abuse?

- One of the main causes of elder abuse at home is stress and burnout. To avoid stress and burnout, practice stress-relieving techniques and take time to care for yourself as well.
- If you recognize elder abuse at a long-term care facility, be sure to report the abuse to the facility supervisor, as well as to the National Center on Elder Abuse: **1-800-677-1116**, Nebraska DHHS Adult Protective Services: **1-800-652-1999**, or Haven House: **1-800-440-4633**.

A Survivor's Path

A domestic violence survivor left her abusive boyfriend after months of abuse. She lost everything because of him. She lost her home and her children. She called the crisis line where she talked to an advocate who listened to her situation and believed that she needed to go into our shelter for her safety. Haven House Advocates provided shelter, case management, advocacy, mental health referrals, clothing vouchers, transportation, housing application assistance, assistance with applying for assistance on Access Nebraska website and referral coordination in order to help her relocate and sustain a home that was free from violence.

She was able to leave our shelter within 45 days with the help of the VOCA Victim Assistance funding which helped her with first month's rent and deposits. This client also had past due arrears which we were able to find assistance to pay for as well. While in our shelter this client was able to establish visitations with her children, which became permanent once she settled into her new home. Haven House helped her furnish her new apartment with donated items and furniture. She is still working through various obstacles but continues to strive towards a better future for her and her children.

Summary of Statistics March 20th—June 25th 2019

Haven House provided services to a total of 138 individuals. Emergency shelter services were provided to 6 individuals (5 adults + 1 child). Equaling a total of 165 shelter bed nights and 495 meals. One educational programs, to a total audience of 60. Volunteers contributed more than 497 hours.

Tyson Foods Summer Community Internship Program

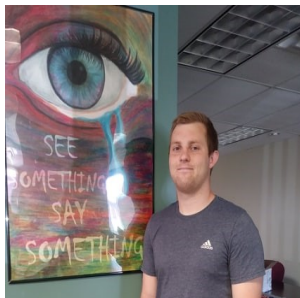

Awareness to End Trafficking

- Next to drug trafficking, human trafficking is one of the largest and fastest-growing criminal operations in the world, netting an estimated \$32 BILLION worldwide each year.
- Human trafficking is modern-day slavery, and includes forced labor, domestic servitude, and commercial sex trafficking. The crime knows no demographic restrictions, and almost everyone is considered a potential target, particularly children and women.
- The National Human Trafficking Hotline (888-373-7888) has reported close to 200 cases of human trafficking in Nebraska since 2007, including 63 in 2017. The vast majority of those cases involved sex trafficking, where victims are forced into prostitution by their traffickers. These criminals take away all forms of communication their victims may use, from mobile devices and driver's license to access to their social media accounts (Facebook, Twitter, etc.).
- Sex trafficking has become more prevalent in recent years. It is defined as a form of human trafficking where people are sexually exploited by means of force, fraud or coercion. It can occur almost anywhere, from a local residence to online escort services, strip clubs or places like a massage parlor or a spar that disguises a brothel.
- Children under the age of 18 are especially vulnerable, as they can be targeted through their social media accounts and encouraged to provide incriminating photos that can then be used against them by a trafficker who threatens to post photos online. The photos are used by traffickers to advertise to those who use their services.
- Though these apps usually support harmless social interaction, below are some apps from our website that have been used to prey on children and teens.
